

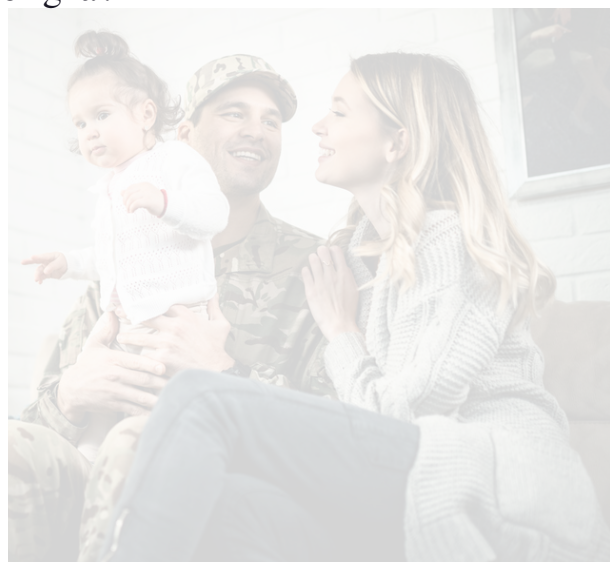


PROVISIONAL ADMISSION FOR MILITARY SPOUSES

Pursuant to [Georgia Supreme Court Rule 103](#), an attorney spouse of an active duty service member of the United States Uniformed Services who is assigned to a post in Georgia may obtain a provisional license to practice law without meeting the "active practice" requirement for admission on motion. (For attorneys who are not military spouses, Georgia requires that they have been primarily engaged in the active practice of law for at least five of the last seven years.) The attorney must have an active license in good standing from any state and meet all other requirements of the Military Spouse Rule.

Provisional admission under the Military Spouse Rule automatically terminates 180 days after certain events listed in the Rule (such as the spouse's retirement or reassignment to another state), but it is possible to convert a provisional admission to full admission if the military spouse has gained the sufficient amount of years to be admitted on motion while provisionally admitted in Georgia.
